Reading Passage: The Success of Rare Beauty

Selena Gomez is now a billionaire. Though she achieved **fame** through acting and music, the majority of her wealth (95%) comes from *Rare Beauty*, her make-up and **cosmetics** company. In 2023, the brand made \$350 million in sales, making it one of the hottest brands today.

Gomez is a *self-made* billionaire. Raised in a tough neighborhood in Grand Prairie, Texas, Gomez had a **modest** upbringing. She became **inspired** to become an actress after seeing her mother perform at a local theater. She began acting as a child, which led her to a major role on Disney's *Wizards of Waverly Place*.

Rare Beauty was **launched** during the pandemic in 2020. It quickly became popular with Gen-Z consumers and social media users. Gomez rejects the idea that makeup should be about achieving perfection. She states, "Makeup is something to enjoy. It's not something you need. I want every person to feel beautiful exactly as they are." She believes her products celebrate people's **individuality**, i.e. what makes them unique (or rare). The brand also aims to be **inclusive** by providing products for all types of skin **tones** and types and it also features many different looking models in its **campaigns**. Gomez has also successfully **associated** the brand with mental health by sharing her own mental health **struggles** publicly. The brand **donates** 1% of its sales to the Rare Impact Fund, which supports mental health services.

At the *Time 100* Summit event in 2024, Gomez commented: "I think that we've been able to do something that, at least in cosmetics, no one has ever done. That's what makes me happy every night when I go to sleep." [Source: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=BLOXQCRYft4>]
